### Services and church opening during the COVID-19 restrictions

During the present phase of COVID-19 restrictions the pattern of services in our benefice is as follows:

9.30am Sunday online. A livestream Eucharist broadcast from either St Mary's, Borwick or St John's, Yealand; this service can be viewed on our benefice YouTube channel.

11.00am Sunday at St Oswald's, Warton. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 50 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

9.30am Wednesday at St John's, Yealand. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 30 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

Our church buildings are open for individual prayer as follows:

St Oswald's: Sundays 8.30am-10.30am; Weds & Thurs 10.00am-4.00pm. St Mary's: Sundays 12noon-4.00pm. St John's: Sunday 12noon-4.00pm; Mondays, Tuesdays & Wednesdays 10.00am-4.00pm.

## Memorial Hall News



I seem to be spending a lot of time these days reading guidelines from local and national government on safe operation of our hall and which activities and events can be held there.

The most recent quidelines were issued on the 24<sup>th</sup> September in an effort to clarify the announcements around "the rule of six".

Since we have put in place all of the recommended measures; hand sanitiser, cleaning stations etc, the Memorial Hall qualifies as a 'Covid-19 secure environment' and as such this means that we can exceed groups of six so long as social distancing is observed and face coverings are worn.

However, our maximum occupancy limit has now been reduced from a maximum of 30 people to 15 people. In addition, we are not allowed to let the hall for events where social distancing measures are likely to be breached. 'Knees ups' involving alcohol are thus definitely out of the question for the moment, but I hope that those few groups which have made a restart can continue to enjoy the amenity.

Obviously, if anything changes, for or against us, then we will react immediately.

Poppies EASY RIBBED KNIT PATTERN

This pattern gives a full ribbed This pattern gives a full ribbed knited popy and is an easy pattern for beginners. The ply of your yan does not matter providing you alusi your needle size to suit. Use a smaller needle size to suit. Use a smaller needle size than you may otherwise use. For instance if you are using 8 ply yanr and usualk knit with 4mm needles, try a 3.75. The size of the popy will change depending on your yanr and needles. ependi eedles.



Coll A Labil red yam (ane ball will make a number of poppies) Coll B small amount of green for centre of popy or a button. Coll C storap of black yam. Body of Popy Using Coll A Cast on 60 st Now 11-0: L2P (for a slighthy smaller poppy do 8 rows of rib). Row 11: k tog across the row.

now 11: A tog across the row. Row 12: S1 1 K2 tog psso... repeat across the row. Break off yram with long tail and thread back through remaining stitches and pull tight. Join edges with mattress stitch

Centre of Poppy Using Cel B Cast on 8 stitches and linit a square (approx 8-10 rows) of stocking stitch. Cut Using Cel B Cast on 8 stitches. The puri side is the right side. Run a line of running stitch around the outside of the lottled square and ease enough to pull the edges of the square line a round and touck under. Finishing

Stich the centre tucked side down to body of poppy and overstitch with black yarn , or alternatively use a black or green button as the centre of your poppy.

### Sakura Project



I have been in touch with the organisers to check on their progress during these difficult days. Happily there are no issues with the growers in Japan and the first batches of trees are being delivered this autumn.
