Services and church opening during the Covid-19 restrictions

During Step 3 of the roadmap out of lockdown the pattern of services in our benefice is as follows:

Sunday 9.30am online. A livestream Eucharist broadcast from either St Mary's, Borwick or St John's, Yealand; this service can be viewed on our benefice [YouTube channel](#).

Sunday 11.00am at St Oswald's, Warton. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 50 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

Wednesday 9.30am at St John's, Yealand. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 30 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

Thursday 11.00am at St Mary's, Borwick. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 24 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

Our church buildings are open for individual prayer as follows:
St Oswald's: Sundays 8.30am-10.30am;
Wednesdays 10.00am-4.00pm.
St Mary's: Sundays 12noon-4.00pm.
St John's: Sunday 1.30pm-4.00pm;
Mondays, Tuesdays & Wednesdays 10.00am-4.00pm.



Archbishop Hutton Trust Charity (Almshouses)

**Warton Almshouses: subsidised housing
for people in need of support**

Hundreds of years ago, a Charity was set up by Archbishop Hutton, who came from the Ancient Parish of Warton. The Charity provides subsidised housing for those in need of support and who at the time of applying, live in the parishes of **Warton, Borwick, Priest Hutton, Yealand Conyers, Yealand Redmayne, or Silverdale.**

At present, there a vacancy. The property is available, at significantly lower cost than would be usual, for an applicant who can demonstrate a need for such support.

The vacant Almshouse is one of a pair of semi-detached bungalows. It has a living room, bedroom, kitchen, bathroom and access to an outdoor area. Viewing can be arranged prior to making an application.



Application forms, and some further details (including costs), are available from the Treasurer (phone details below) and must be returned to the Secretary by **4.00pm on Friday 25th June.**

Applications will be considered by the Trustees and short-listed applicants will be called for interview in mid-July.
