Reports from the villages

Priest Hutton Parish

The parish meeting on 21 January was fairly well attended which was pleasing and the three current officers were reelected en bloc to serve for one more year.

As a group in January we take a little time out at our AGM to reflect on the past year and plan for the year ahead. This is a good thing – it focuses the mind and encourages those of us who perform the major roles to evaluate how effective we have been.

Looking back over the past year I note with pride our achievements. You will notice that within each statement there is always a "but" or "apart from". Sadly, this is the ongoing situation and nothing ever gets totally finished!!! However, we have achieved quite a lot, some of which has been outstanding for years:

The work at **Hutton View** has been completed (apart from a small section outside no 4)

Road signs – most have been supplied and fitted (apart from several still not appeared)

The hedge on Whitebeck Lane belonging to Roger Mason was cut – very badly to improve vision for drivers and cyclists. We have no way of ensuring that this work is to be done on a regular basis.

Investigation into what is happening at the **barn** on the Burton Road has taken place and the City Council are happy with the result.

The **telephone box** has been made into a "Wet Weather Hub" for school children ie. a place to store umbrellas and hang

wet coats during the day but sadly 2 umbrellas have gone missing from there.

White lines have been refreshed throughout the village but we await road markings outside Gatelands House, opposite the Longlands, where lines are needed to show which vehicle has right of way.

We have had 2 very successful community events – **a litter pick** and a session of **dredging the beck**.

The installation of the **War Memorial** was an extra special event to which we contributed both financially and in several other ways. We saw villagers at the Memorial Hall that Sunday afternoon whom we have never seen here before, and it was a credit to those involved.

By far our greatest achievement continues to be the work of the **PRIEST HUTTON FLOOD ACTION GROUP.** In this we have invested time, effort and money and I look forward to be able to report great results in the near future.

Our **County Officer C.C. Phillippa Williamson** continues to fight our corner at County and local level and in this respect we are very fortunate.

We look forward to new things for the year 2020/21:

1. **Cherry Trees Project** – Ken Dunn is in the process of arranging for us to receive somewhere in the region of thirty cherry trees from the Japanese

Government as part of a goodwill gesture between the two countries. It



is planned to plant these on the large Nature Reserve. (See page 9.) 2. The **3 benches** currently sited in the Nature Reserves will be removed, restored and re-sited around the village.

3. The phone box will need painting.

Thank you to everyone in Priest Hutton for all your support and efforts. Special thanks go to Martin Shuttleworth, our chairman and to Phil Horsfield, our treasurer, for his flawless account keeping. The Parish Meeting can only exist with the support of you, our members - and simply by coming to our meetings and being part of the debate is what makes this group a success.

Sakura Cherry Tree Project

The Sakura Cherry tree project is an initiative of the Japan-British Society whereby, as a gesture of friendship between the two countries, Japanese business will donate over 1000 trees to selected sites across the UK over the course of 2020 and 2021. You may already have seen announcements in the national press concerning those stands which have so far been established in our Royal Parks.



I am delighted to announce that the Parish Meeting of Priest Hutton gave its unanimous approval to our application to participate in the scheme at their meeting on the 21st January and that we have been granted provisional approval from the project managers, to establish a stand of trees on our Parish lands adjacent to Whitebeck Lane.

We will prepare a survey and planting plan for the site in the coming weeks and await delivery of our trees over winter 2020/2021. The saplings, stakes and fertilizer will be provided by the Sakura team. We will need to take care of the planting and their maintenance until they are established. It will be a long term project, of course, but I hope we can enjoy the springtime blossom in a few years from now.

Simon Smith has set up a page in the Community section of the website where you will find updates on our progress and I will add a piece to the Newsletter from time to time.

Priest Hutton Neighbourhood Watch Report

There have been two incidents reported in Priest Hutton; the theft of a tractor and items stolen from storage units by the canal near Lock House. The stolen tractor was found in the Bolton-Le-Sands area and has been recovered. The Police have made two arrests and there is a third suspect being sought. All three suspects are from the Bolton area and have been staying in Morecambe and targeting rural farms and villages.

There have been recent thefts locally of farm machinery, vehicles and plant, particularly quad bikes. In addition, two Land Rovers were taken from farms in Silverdale and Capernwray, which were recovered following a pursuit by Officers. Some of the vehicles were stolen with keys and during the day. Police also believe the individuals involved in these thefts were responsible for stealing a motorbike which was recovered in Warton. There have also been reports of deer poaching with dogs in the Silverdale and Arnside areas.

The lessons we should all learn from these incidents are to take care, be observant and secure our property and possessions.

Snow Flower and the Secret Fan

Lisa See (2005)

This novel is set in nineteenth-century China and tells Lily's (the narrator) story from birth, through childhood, marriage, and into old age. It's a fascinating glimpse into the lives and plight of women living at that time in a culture so entirely different from our own. Some of it is hard to comprehend, most notably the custom of footbinding, but also the friendships brokered between women in order to fulfil a need for intimacy not met by their husbands. In many ways, though their voice was not permitted to be heard out loud, the women of China at that time practiced Girl Power well before the phrase was ever coined!

I'd heartily recommend this novel – there are not many that stay with me in quite the way this one has! Since reading Snow Flower, I have read other novels by the same author which I have enjoyed equally; always about Chinese culture but set in different historical time periods.
