Hello all!

We are living in 'strange times', as we know. Coronavirus is affecting everyone, with all of us being encouraged to stay at home as much as possible, and some people advised to stay inside for a prolonged period of time to shield them from possible infection.

These residents in particular, but any one of us in reality, may need some extra support to prevent feelings of isolation and to help with practical issues such as collecting prescriptions, shopping, or addressing problems in the home.

To this end, Sal Riding, from Priest Hutton, is co-ordinating the villages' efforts on behalf of the Borwick and Priest Hutton Emergency Planning Group, and you should have received an email or letter explaining this the week before last. Since then the government has set up the NHS Volunteer Responders scheme, but we don't yet know how this will dovetail with our local efforts.

Sal's role so far has been to compile a list of willing volunteers to 'buddy' with individuals via phone/email, and to link these volunteers with people who have asked for some extra support. It's fairly early days in the 'lockdown' period, and as time goes on people's needs may change, so if you haven't reached out for help already please remember that you can do so at any time.

We have also established a Borwick and Priest Hutton-wide **WhatsApp group** to share information, make requests for help and communicate with each other to alleviate loneliness and isolation. Currently there are 46 members, but there is no limit (that I know of!) so there's plenty of room for more people to join!

A lot of the benefit is to do with feeling connected to others, and as you can imagine there is a lot of posting of funny video clips and pictures from the internet, but there have also been other examples of its usefulness. For example, information given about Sunday newspaper deliveries, the mobile fish van, and a Priest Hutton resident was able to share a large rhubarb crop by leaving it on the benches on Priest Hutton and Borwick village greens and let people know via the WhatsApp group that it was there to take.

In a few weeks I will have some surplus 'Gardeners' Delight' tomato plants to share with anyone who wants them, and there may be others of you with similar things to give.



Some weeks ago, many of us watched and enjoyed the film "Mrs Lowry and Son" at our Village Hall. I am a Salford girl, born and bred, and anything "Lowry" interests me greatly.

Stimulated by this film I began to create a piece of Art Work in the style of Lowry (which has rather a lot of Picasso in it!). I am only part way through it, but, whilst doing some research I came across this article (by Shelley Rohde) which I really did find positive and uplifting. What a talented but humble man Lowry was.

'One day Lowry saw a business man lying asleep flat out on a wall. Lowry knew he was a businessman because he had a bowler hat on his stomach, and in those days businessmen often wore bowler hats.

And besides, he had a briefcase beside him on the ground.

'That's me when I retire', said Lowry.

And he painted a man lying flat on a wall, smoking a cigarette, and on the briefcase he wrote his own initials.

In truth, Lowry never did retire. When he was 65 he gave up going into the offices of the Pall Mall Property Company, where he had worked as a rent collector for 42 years.

"*I'll not be in tomorrow",* he announced casually one day. And he was not.

But that didn't mean that he gave up his real job. He didn't abandon his art. He couldn't. He had started drawing "little ships and things" when he was 6 or 7, and he stopped on the day he died at the age of 88.

Towards the end of his life, Lowry was offered many honours, all of which he turned down.

"I have been thanked enough," he wrote, refusing a knighthood. "People have bought my pictures".'

Memorial Hall News



Sadly, we have been forced to close the Memorial Hall for the time being. We will review the situation, in accordance with the Government guidelines, at the beginning of July.

Our first casualty was the Movies Day scheduled for the 27th March. The Lunesdale Arts Society had booked a showing of **Judy** in the afternoon and we were due to screen **The Good Liar** in the evening. Having seen **Judy** some months ago, I found the film very predictable and over long. It is possibly unfair to draw comparisons with **La Vie en Rose**, which won a cartload of awards, but whereas Marion Cotillard's Edith Piaf is truly tragic, Natalie Portman's Judy Garland is really just a bit sad.

The Good Liar on the other hand is an excellent movie which, I understand, will be coming to Netflix soon. If you get a chance, try to see it. The sting is very much in the tail with a plot twist which is very unexpected. I will not give away any more but the film really shows the strength of British cinema with an excellent script handled masterfully by Helen Mirren and Ian McKellen.

We also thought it prudent to **cancel the Village Fete** which had been scheduled for mid-August since none of the clubs and societies are meeting for the foreseeable future.

However, we will eventually get to the other side of this and there seems to be a wave of support for a **Villages Big Bash** come the autumn, when we can roll together all the events that we have missed into something epic. I have no firm idea as to what that might be yet, but I do recall that when we combine large quantities of food and music with moderate amounts of alcohol we generally seem to have a fine time!

The Sakura Cherry Tree Project

Following the unanimous support at the Priest Hutton Parish Meeting, I prepared a draft planting plan and sent our application to the Sakura organisers. This plan incorporates the existing native species on the site and requires us to plant 26 cherry trees to complete the stand. I am happy to report that the organisers accepted our application and, all being well, our trees should arrive with us late in the autumn. I have left the choice on mix of trees, from the three available varieties (see below), up to the Japanese partner organisation. They will prepare a final suggested planting plan.

Priest Hutton Neighbourhood Watch Report

Phillippa Williamson, our County Councillor, has informed us that the local police are prioritising thefts from rural properties on the A6 corridor. Criminals are looking for cash, jewellery and keys to high performance cars which are used to get away from the scene. In Over Kellett, the keys to a BMW2 and an Aston Martin were stolen, and in Carnforth a BMW M3 was stolen.

Some good news: six members of an organised crime group from the North East have been sentenced to a total of 29 years for thefts from properties in north Lancashire and south Cumbria. Another group from Warrington are currently on remand for numerous thefts of vehicles and burglaries in Silverdale and Morecambe.

Finally, the police have asked the public to be aware of the theft of catalytic converters from cars. Honda vehicles are being particularly targeted.
