During the next steps of the roadmap out of lockdown the pattern of services in our benefice is as follows:

Sunday 11.00am at St Oswald's, Warton. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 50 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

Wednesday 9.30am at St John's, Yealand. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 30 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

Thursday 11.00am at St Mary's, Borwick. A public Eucharist with a maximum of 24 people able to attend the service; appropriate hygiene and social distancing measures will be in place.

St Oswald's: Sundays 8.30am-10.30am; Wednesdays 10.00am-4.00pm.
St Mary's: Sundays 12noon-4.00pm.
St John's: Sunday 1.30pm-4.00pm; Mondays, Tuesdays & Wednesdays 10.00am-4.00pm.

Sakura Project



Our flowering cherry trees arrived a little early. They had originally been promised for November but I got an urgent message from the organisers to say that so many groups had dropped out because of Covid that they were well ahead of their schedule and had a nursery full of saplings. "If you can plant them, we will send you trees".

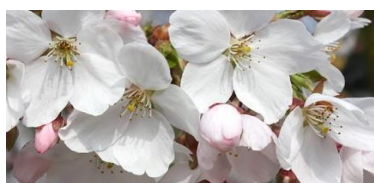
I checked with our team and by a very lucky break all of them had open slots in their social calendars, so on we went to plant 25 of them on the Priest Hutton parish lands. Actually, there are 22 of them planted on the former village midden and 3 "living spares" sitting on the opposite side of Whitebeck Lane in the small seating area. We may need to infill with one of these should any of the main stand fail to thrive.

The saplings we received were grown in Japan and delivered as two year old bare rooted plants. They are a mixture of three varieties:

Beni-yutaka: This will produce semi-double flowers in deep pink and fiery red leaves in the autumn



Yedoensis: Sometimes called the Tokyo cherry, this will produce white flowers with a blush of pink.



Tai-haku: This one is a true white, and the variety has an interesting history.

Having become extinct in Japan, a healthy specimen was found by chance in a garden in Sussex. The plant had been sent to England from Japan to a Mrs. Freeman in about 1900. However, the tree in her garden was near death in 1923 when Collingwood Ingram, an authority on Japanese flowering cherries, noticed the large size and beauty of its few flowers. He collected a few twigs of bud wood from which thousands of trees have since been propagated, re-introduced to Japan and subsequently distributed world-wide. When Ingram reintroduced it to Japan in 1932 it was named 'Tai-haku' ("Great White") by Prince Taka Tsukasa of the imperial court.



The advice for the best and most long-lived display was to plant them in rows 7m apart with a random mix of the varieties.

Although there is a tiny amount of blossom on them now, I am told that they should provide a small display in about four years from now and that they will reach their full height in around ten years.

The Sakura project itself was launched in the joint communique issued by Prime Minister Shinzo Abe and the then British Prime Minister Theresa May when the two met in Japan in autumn 2017. Because cherry blossom (sakura) is an international symbol of Japan, over six thousand cherry trees will be planted throughout the UK starting in 2021 and into 2022. Our site is not yet on the official site map but once there we will find ourselves in regal company since the chosen sites include four Royal Parks: Regents Park, Richmond Park, Greenwich Park and Bushy Park.
